With constitutional jurisdiction transferred from the Supreme Court, the FCCP ensures focused and efficient adjudication of constitutional matters, including fundamental rights and federal disputes.

As the guardian of the Constitution, the Court is committed to upholding the rule of law, constitutional supremacy, and the federal balance in Pakistan.

3. Adjudication and authoritative interpretation of constitutional questions (Article 175E(5))
4. Preservation of constitutional supremacy and the federal balance

- Dedication to constitutional supremacy

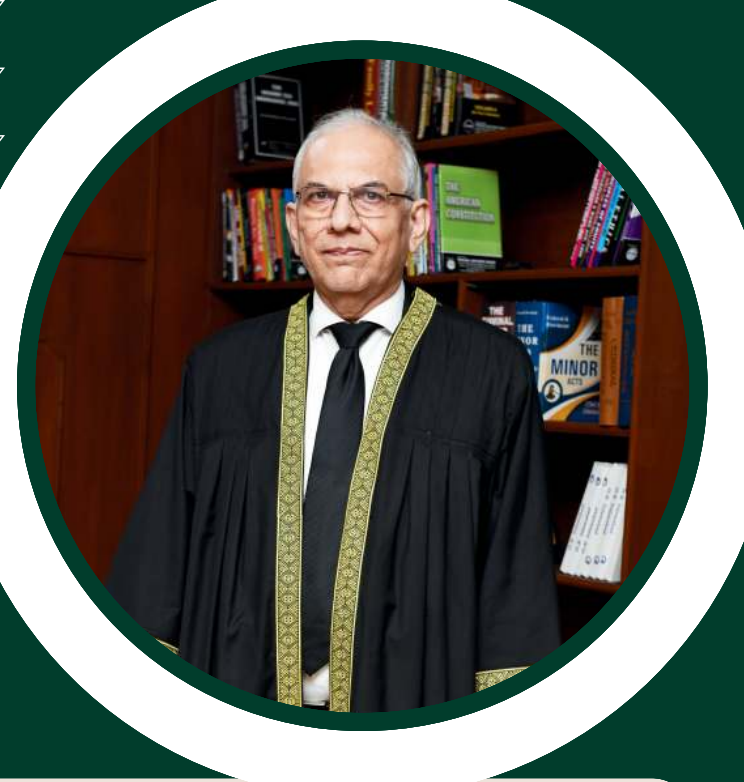

## Hon'ble Mr. Chief Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan

Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan was born on 1<sup>st</sup> December, 1960 in Multan. He belongs to a noble family of the renowned lawyer of his time, Khan Sadiq Muhammad Ahsan, Advocate (Late). He received his early education from Kindergarten Muslim School, Multan, and completed his secondary education from Government Muslim High School, Multan, in 1977. He earned his Bachelor's degree in Philosophy in 1981 and completed his LL.B. from University Law College, Multan, in 1984, along with a diploma in Taxation Law. He began his legal practice as a junior with his father and obtained a licence to practice in the lower courts in 1985. He was enrolled as an Advocate of the Lahore High Court in 1987 and later enrolled as an Advocate of the Supreme Court of Pakistan in 2001. In the same year, he joined Zafar Law Chambers, Multan, where he remained until his elevation to the Bench. He primarily practiced on the civil side, appearing before courts from the trial courts up to the august Supreme Court of Pakistan in important cases relating to property, pre-emption, and inheritance, which remained his areas of special interest. He was elevated to the Bench on 12<sup>th</sup> May, 2011. During his judicial career, he decided thousands of old civil cases at the Bahawalpur Bench, Multan Bench, and Principal Seat, Lahore, and most of his judgments were upheld by the august Supreme Court of Pakistan. In 1977, he represented Pakistan as a Boy Scout at the Asian Jamboree in Iran and was awarded a 'Sash' by the President of Pakistan. He also served as an examiner and lecturer in various subjects at University Law College, Multan. As a Judge of the Lahore High Court, he remained a member of the syndicates of various universities, including the University of Engineering and Technology, Lahore. He was elevated as a Judge of the Supreme Court of Pakistan on 21<sup>st</sup> October, 2019 and served there until 13<sup>th</sup> November, 2025. He took oath as the first Chief Justice of the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan on 14<sup>th</sup> November, 2025.



## Mr. Justice Syed Hasan Azhar Rizvi

### ABOUT

Justice Syed Hasan Azhar Rizvi was born on 2<sup>nd</sup> February, 1962 in Karachi. His late father, Syed Ali Azhar Rizvi, was a prominent member of the Central Committee of the All India Muslim Students Federation and held several important positions within the organization in Uttar Pradesh and Lucknow, India; he actively participated in the Pakistan Movement and later served the Government of Pakistan with distinction in the Cabinet Secretariat, holding a highly important and sensitive position before his retirement.

Justice Rizvi initially obtained a Bachelor's degree in Science and subsequently pursued legal studies. After completing his LL.B., he further enhanced his academic credentials by obtaining an LL.M. degree.

He commenced his legal practice in 1988 under the mentorship of his uncle, Syed Izhar Haider Rizvi, a distinguished Senior Advocate, renowned educationalist, and author of several authoritative books on law. He was enrolled as an Advocate of the Lower Courts on 8<sup>th</sup> October, 1988, as an Advocate of the High Courts on 1<sup>st</sup> December, 1990, and later as an Advocate of the Supreme Court of Pakistan on 18<sup>th</sup> January, 2003.

He has served as Legal Advisor/Advocate for multiple state organizations, a few of them are the National Bank of Pakistan, the Karachi Port Trust, and the Port Qasim Authority, Karachi.

In addition to litigation, he also undertook advisory work as part of his practice. He has served as an advisor to the Karachi Electric Supply Corporation and a retainer to the Balochistan Particle Board Limited, the Habib & Sons (Pvt.) Limited and the Partico (Pvt.) Limited etc. He was also a part-time lecturer at the Law Department of Federal Government Urdu Law College (presently Urdu University), Karachi.

He was elevated to the Bench at the High Court of Sindh on 18<sup>th</sup> February, 2010. He mostly decided cases pertaining to commercial, banking, civil, tax, criminal, intellectual property and services matters. He was entrusted with additional administrative duties by various Chief Justices of the said High Court. The following are a few of the committees on which he served:

- Chairman – Selection Committee for Promotion
- Chairman – Rule Committee (Civil)
- Chairman – Development Committee
- Chairman – Committee to Determine Inter-Se Seniority of Judges
- Chairman – Clinic Committee
- Member – Administration Committee
- Member – Selection Board

In addition to the above-mentioned committees, he was also designated as the Inspection Judge of the Commercial Courts, Environmental Protection Tribunals, and Anti-Corruption Courts in the Province of Sindh, with the responsibility to supervise and monitor their performance as well as the standard of their judicial work.

In October, 2017, while serving as a Judge of the High Court of Sindh, he participated in the Regional Collegium on the Enforcement of Intellectual Property Rights for Judges of Higher Courts, held in Tokyo, Japan, and organized by the World Intellectual Property Organization.

During 2021–2022, he supervised and monitored the conduct of the MCQ test and the written examinations held for the appointment of the Civil Judges in the Province of Sindh.

He was elevated to the Supreme Court of Pakistan on 11<sup>th</sup> November, 2022. During his tenure of more than three years at the Supreme Court of Pakistan, he adjudicated a wide range of cases involving constitutional, civil, criminal, and service matters. Pursuant to the Constitution (Twenty-Sixth Amendment) Act, 2024, he was nominated by the Judicial Commission of Pakistan as a member of the Constitutional Bench of the Supreme Court of Pakistan.

As a member of the Constitutional Bench, he had the privilege of hearing several historic cases of profound constitutional significance, including matters relating to the vires of the Supreme Court (Practice and Procedure) Act, 2023, the NAB Amendments Case, the Bhutto Reference, and the trial of civilians by military courts.

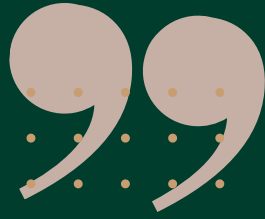
On 14<sup>th</sup> November, 2025, he was appointed as a Judge of the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan. Being the senior-most Judge of the FCCP, he is a member of the Judicial Commission of Pakistan as well as the Supreme Judicial Council of Pakistan.



## Mr. Justice Aamer Farooq

### ABOUT

Hon'ble Mr. Justice Aamer Farooq was born on 26th April, 1969. He got his Senior Cambridge certificate in the year 1986 from St. Anthony's High School Lahore and Higher Senior Cambridge certificate from Aitchison College in the year 1988. He secured his LLB degree from London University, UK and qualified as Barrister-at-Law from Lincoln's Inn, London in the year 1993. He was enrolled as an Advocate of the Lahore High Court in the year 1994 and as an Advocate of the Supreme Court of Pakistan in the year 2007. Hon'ble Mr. Justice Aamer Farooq established his law practice at Lahore with an Office at Islamabad as well, dealing mostly with banking, commercial, tax and civil matters. Since 2009 until his elevation, he was part of adjunct faculty at Lahore University of Management Sciences. Hon'ble Mr. Justice Aamer Farooq took Oath as an Additional Judge of Islamabad High Court on 1st January, 2015 and as confirmed Judge on 23rd December, 2015. He was elevated to the Supreme Court of Pakistan on 14<sup>th</sup> February, 2025. He served at the Supreme Court until 13<sup>th</sup> November, 2025 and was sworn in as a Judge of the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan on 14<sup>th</sup> November, 2025.



## Mr. Justice Ali Baqar Najafi

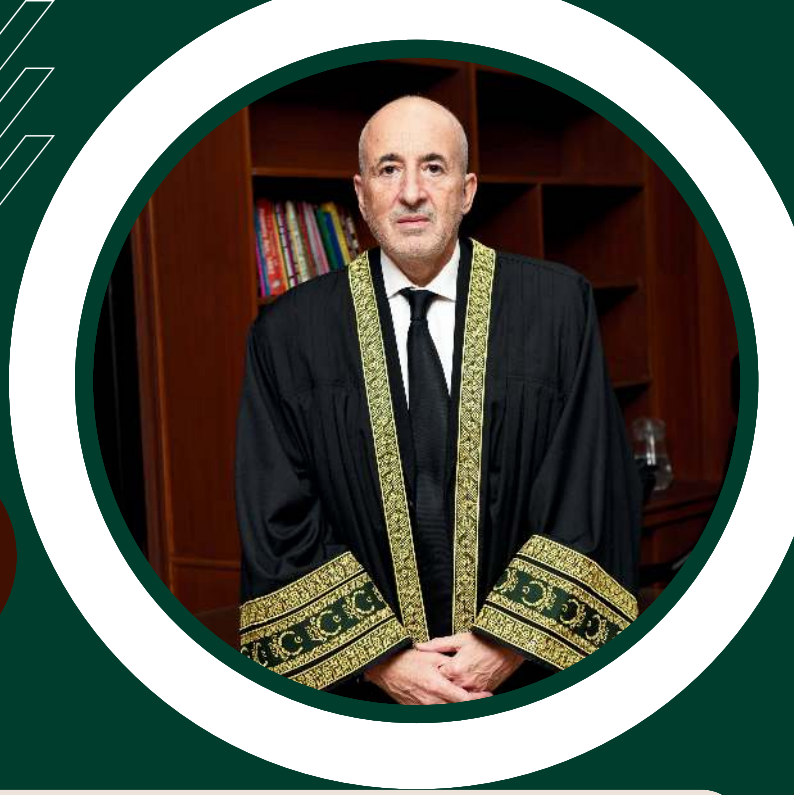
## ABOUT

Justice Ali Baqar Najafi is a distinguished Pakistani jurist, legal scholar, and former Advocate Supreme Court with extensive experience in legal practice, legal education and superior judiciary. He obtained his early education from Govt. Muslim Model High School, Urdu Bazar, Lahore, completed his B.Sc. from Government College Lahore, and earned his LL.B degree in 1989 from Punjab University Law College.

He joined the legal profession in 1989 and, after completing his apprenticeship, started legal practice with his father, Late Ali Huzoor Najafi, Advocate Supreme Court. He was enrolled as an Advocate of the High Courts in 1990 and, subsequently, as an Advocate of the Supreme Court of Pakistan. During his legal career, he conducted over 1,000 cases before the Lower Courts, Federal Shariat Court, High Courts, and the Supreme Court of Pakistan. His law practice covered constitutional, civil, criminal, corporate, banking, customs, narcotics, anti-corruption, white collar crime, labour, immigration, and Islamic laws, including public interest and human rights litigation.

Besides legal practice, he had remained associated with legal education for many years and taught Constitutional Law, International Law, Islamic Law, Land Laws, and Minor Acts at Punjab University Law College and other private law colleges. He also served as Internal and External Examiner at Punjab University Lahore and contributed to legal journalism also as Editor of the Law Page of The News.

He was elevated as a Judge of the Lahore High Court on 16th April, 2012, where he decided more than 37,000 cases in criminal, civil, constitutional, banking, labour, family, anti-corruption, NAB and human rights jurisdictions. He also conducted the judicial inquiry into the 2014 Model Town incident. After his appointment on 16th April, 2025 and service at the Supreme Court of Pakistan until 13<sup>th</sup> November, 2025, he was sworn in as a Judge of the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan on 14<sup>th</sup> November, 2025. So far he has decided more than 40,000 cases in his judicial career.



# Mr. Justice Muhammad Karim Khan Agha

## ABOUT

After graduating with an LLB 2:1 (Hons) degree from Birmingham University in the UK and passing the Law Society Solicitors Finals Examination from Guildford College of Law his Lordship commenced his legal career in 1987 at the prestigious city of London Law firm Cameron Markby as a solicitor of the Supreme Court of England and Wales. His main practice areas were investment property and secured lending. On his return to Pakistan his Lordship was enrolled as an advocate of the High Court and entered private practice with his main practice areas being banking, customs and criminal law. His Lordship also served for a brief period as country legal counsel for Citibank NA Pakistan. He was later called to the Bar from Lincolns Inn London. After competitive interview his Lordship was appointed as a prosecutor at the United Nations (UN) International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia (ICTY) based in the Hague. Whilst at the ICTY his Lordship was involved in some notable prosecutions for war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide during the 1990's Balkans conflict including the prosecution of the former President of Serbia Slobodan Milosevic. Whilst at The Hague his Lordship also graduated from the prestigious Leiden University with an LLM in Public International Law (with Specialization in International Criminal law). After serving at the ICTY his Lordship was appointed to the UN backed Special Court for Sierra Leone to lead the prosecution of the Armed Forces Revolutionary Council (AFRC) for war crimes and crimes against humanity during their overthrow of the then Sierra Leonean Government. He was later appointed a senior Appeals Counsel in the AFRC and Civil Defence Force (CDF) appeals and assisted in drafting the Indictment of Charles Taylor the former President of Liberia who was later convicted of war crimes and crimes against humanity. On his return to Pakistan his Lordship again recommenced his private practice and was appointed as an advocate of the Supreme Court before being elevated as an Additional Judge of the Sindh High Court under a democratically elected Government only to be denotified following the Sindh High Court Bar Association case (PLD 2009 SC 879). There after his Lordship was appointed as Additional Attorney General for Pakistan appearing before the Supreme Court in Islamabad where he appeared in some notable cases such as the 18th Amendment case before a 17<sup>th</sup> Member full bench of the Supreme Court and the powers/authority of the Parliamentary Committee on the appointment of Superior Court Judges and numerous international arbitrations. His Lordship was then appointed as Prosecutor General Accountability of the National Accountability Bureau where he completed his three year non renewable tenure before returning to the Bar where he was appointed as amicus Curiae by the then Chief Justice of Pakistan to the Supreme Court Commission established to examine whether there had been any poll rigging in the 2013 General Elections. After serving briefly as General Counsel for the State Bank of Pakistan his Lordship was again elevated to the Bench as an Additional Judge of the Sindh High Court and confirmed a year later. His Lordship was appointed by the Judicial Commission of Pakistan as Head of the Constitutional Benches for Sindh on 25-11-24 a position which he held until his elevation to the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan. His Lordship Prior to being elevated to the bench, attended conferences and seminars both inside and outside of Pakistan. These included in Islamabad numerous International Conferences organized by the Supreme Court of Pakistan; in London, England on Property law (landlord and tenant law); in Geneva, Switzerland on Human Rights law; in the Hague, Netherlands on International Humanitarian law and International Human Rights law; in Vienna, Austria on the United Nations Convention against Corruption. His Lordship has also trained prosecutors in Bosnia and Cambodia in International Humanitarian law and lectured at SM law college Karachi on British Constitutional and Administrative law and at the Faculty of law at the University of Freetown on International Humanitarian law and Human Rights law. After being elevated to the bench his Lordship has acted as Chairman of the Service Tribunal dealing with internal service appeals of Sindh High Court employees, acted as monitoring Judge of the Accountability Courts in Sindh, monitoring Judge of the Districts of Shikarpur and Mirpurkhas. He has been/is a part of various internal Committees of the Sindh High Court as well as being a part of the Board of Governors of some Universities in Sindh. He took oath as a Judge of the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan on 15<sup>th</sup> November, 2025.



## Mr. Justice Rozi Khan Barrech

### ABOUT

Justice Rozi Khan Barrech Son of Mehrban Khan, was born on 7th March, 1964 in Quetta. He completed his matriculation in 1984 and Intermediate in 1986. He did his graduation in 1988. He completed LLB from University Law College, Quetta in 1990 and Masters in 1991. Justice Rozi Khan Barrech was enrolled in Balochistan High Court Bar in the year 1992 and joined District judiciary in Balochistan as Additional Districts and Sessions Judge in the year 1998. He has served in various districts of Balochistan as Additional District & Sessions Judge and District & Sessions Judge, Special Judge and District & Sessions Judge Inspection. He took charge of Registrar, High Court of Balochistan on 4th November, 2016. Justice Rozi Khan Barrech was elevated as Additional Judge of the High Court of Balochistan on 31st May, 2019 and confirmed as Judge of the High Court of Balochistan on 07th of May, 2021. Justice Rozi Khan Barrech took oath as Acting Chief Justice of the High Court of Balochistan on 06th June, 2025. Justice Rozi Khan Barrech took oath as Chief Justice of the High Court of Balochistan on 08th July, 2025. He was elevated as Judge Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan on 17<sup>th</sup> November, 2025. Mr. Justice Rozi Khan Barrech has also attended various national and international trainings, workshops, seminars, and conferences relating to judicial administration, legal reforms, and the justice sector.



# Mr. Justice Syed Arshad Hussain Shah

## ABOUT

Honourable Justice Syed Arshad Hussain Shah was born on 10<sup>th</sup> January, 1964 in Abbottabad. He earned a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) degree, followed by a Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.), and started his legal practice in 1992. As Chairman of the Commission of Inquiry on Enforced Disappearances (COIOED), he directed various government departments to provide free education, uniforms, books, and healthcare facilities, including medicines, to the families of missing persons through BISP, Jafeez Funds, and Zakat Funds. He also facilitated free legal aid and directed all concerned departments to resolve related issues.

As Chief Judge of the Supreme Appellate Court, Gilgit-Baltistan (2019–2022), Justice Shah conducted cases across nearly every field of law. As Chairman of the Judicial Policy Making Committee, he led reforms relating to court performance, case management, and judicial accountability.

Justice Shah has served as Deputy Attorney General for Pakistan, Additional Advocate General for Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and Chief Coordinator/Legal Advisor to the FBR, including the Sindh Revenue Board and others. He has appeared before the Supreme Court of Pakistan in more than 1,000 cases. His litigation portfolio includes civil, constitutional, tax, customs, human rights, corporate, service, natural resource, labour, criminal, and family matters, resulting in several reported precedents in leading law journals such as PLD, SCMR, PLJ, SC, and PTD.

In his executive capacity as Caretaker Chief Minister of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Justice Shah ensured continuity of governance during a sensitive political transition. He played a central role in maintaining law and order, facilitating free and fair elections, and ensuring coordination among provincial institutions.

Among his notable achievements as Chief Minister was the inauguration of the first quantum valley project in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. He also inaugurated the groundbreaking initiative "Khushal Khyber Pakhtunkhwa," aimed at revolutionising governance and public service delivery in the province. This digital platform enables real-time monitoring of government departments, ensuring transparency, accountability, and efficiency.

Justice Shah also coordinated with international development partners, including the World Bank and United Nations, on sectoral planning in education, health, tourism, agriculture, livestock, minerals, and human development. During his tenure as Caretaker Minister for Law, Human Rights, Parliamentary Affairs, Auqaf, Hajj, Religious and Minority Affairs, Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, he supervised legal administration, protection of minority and human rights, and oversight of religious and charitable institutions. He also supervised legislative amendments aimed at strengthening the protection of lawyers' and women's rights.

Justice Shah organised interfaith harmony seminars to promote unity and integrity among different religions. He also managed corporate liquidation matters.

His academic contributions include a research publication in the Pakistan Development Review, Vol. 46, No. 4 (Winter 2007), focusing on natural resource and land revenue law implications. He has participated in multiple international judicial conferences in Islamabad and New Delhi, contributing to regional dialogue on judicial reform and constitutional governance.

He was sworn in as Judge of the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan on 17th November, 2025.

Muhammad Hafeez Ullah Khan (Tamgha-e-Imtiaz) is a distinguished legal, administrative, and literary figure with over four decades of service across the judiciary, public administration, judicial training, and intellectual scholarship. Holding an LL.M. and a Master's degree in History, he began legal practice in 1980 and also served as Programme Producer at Radio Pakistan and Lecturer in Law at Islamia University Bahawalpur, contributing to legal education and public communication.

Demonstrating exceptional merit, he qualified the CSS (12th Common), PCS (Executive), and PCS (Judicial) examinations. After briefly serving as Excise & Taxation Officer, he joined the Punjab District Judiciary, where he served with distinction from Civil Judge to District & Sessions Judge in various districts, maintaining high standards of judicial administration, procedural discipline, and efficient case disposal.

As Chairman and Senior Member of the Punjab Service Tribunal, he contributed significantly to strengthening service jurisprudence through transparent, merit-based adjudication and institutional reforms. His role as Additional Secretary, Government of Punjab, Law & Parliamentary Affairs Department, included legislative drafting, formulation of rules and regulatory frameworks, promotion of e-governance initiatives, and support for the Access to Justice Programme in collaboration with international development partners.

At the Lahore High Court, as In-Charge National Judicial Policy and Information Technology, he led judicial administration reforms, strengthened case management systems, introduced monitoring mechanisms, and contributed to backlog reduction initiatives. In judicial education, he served in senior leadership positions at the Punjab Judicial Academy and Federal Judicial Academy, focusing on institutional modernization, IT-based monitoring systems, research development, and capacity building of judicial officers.

Apart from his legal and administrative career, Mr. Khan is a nationally recognized literary scholar and author of numerous works on history, poetry, fiction, research, and criticism. He also served as Member, Board of Governors of the Pakistan Academy of Letters (2015–2018). Recipient of the Tamgha-e-Imtiaz and several national literary honours, he represents a remarkable blend of judicial service, intellectual scholarship, and cultural contribution.

### Coordination, Protocol & Official Engagements

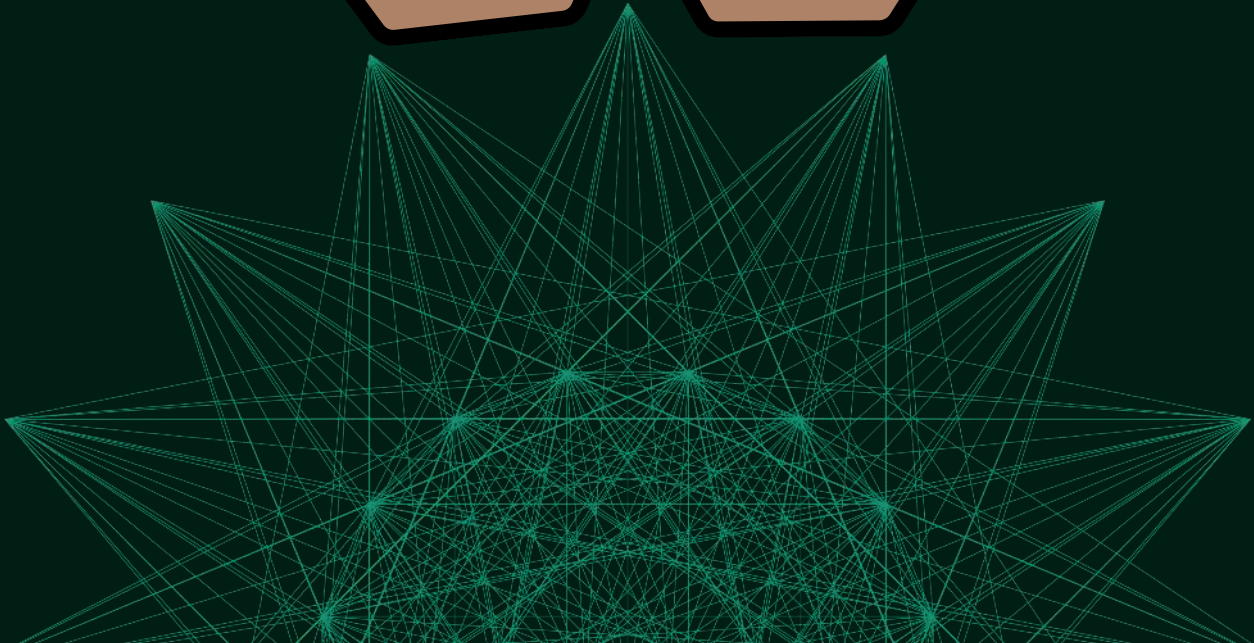

## Digital Case Management & Remote Registry Integration

The IT Wing successfully transferred and structured case data and developed a comprehensive Case Management System, enabling efficient digital handling, tracking, and workflow management of 21,671 cases while registering more than 1,200 cases at the Principal Seat and remote registries. The system was extended to Lahore, Peshawar, Karachi and Quetta registries, facilitating decentralised case filing and improving accessibility to constitutional justice.

## Website Development, Communication & Digital Services

The official FCCP website was launched on 25<sup>th</sup> February, 2026 with enhanced digital services including online access to case information, judgments, orders, and cause lists. Secure online modules for case adjournments, early hearing requests, copy applications, and notice responses were introduced along with SMS and email notification systems to improve communication and public accessibility for advocates and litigants.

## IT Infrastructure, Digitisation & ERP Development

The IT Wing established a strong technological foundation through deployment of network infrastructure covering more than 160 nodes, procurement of IT equipment, and initiation of digitisation through scanning and OCR-based processing of case files. Work also commenced on Store Management and Human Resource Management systems aimed at strengthening administrative efficiency, transparency, and resource management within the FCCP.

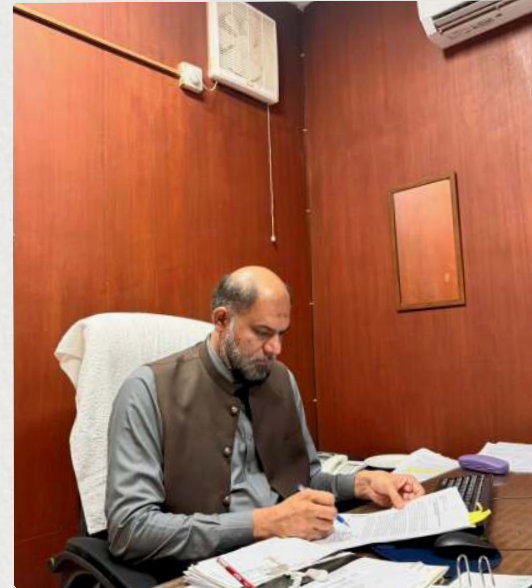

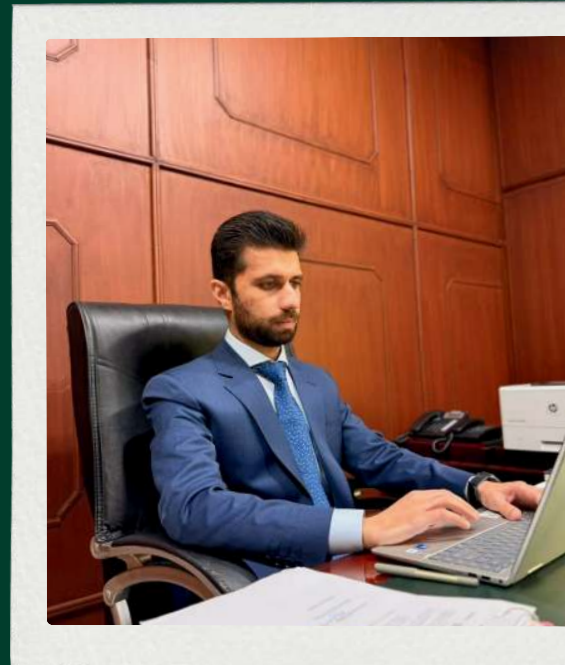
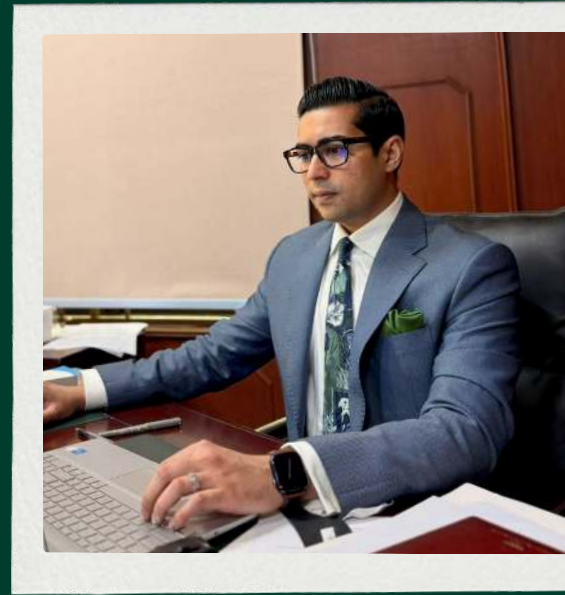

#### **Establishment & Institutional Vision**

The Research Cell of the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan was established as a significant institutional initiative under the vision of Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan to strengthen constitutional adjudication through structured legal research and scholarly assistance. Formally inaugurated on 20<sup>th</sup> November, 2025, the Research Cell was designed to promote analytical depth, constitutional scholarship, and principled judicial reasoning within the Court.

#### **Research Support & Constitutional Scholarship**

The Research Cell comprises eleven (11) Research Officers from diverse professional backgrounds including academia, judicial clerkships, and the subordinate judiciary, enabling a multidisciplinary approach toward constitutional interpretation and judicial research. The Cell actively assists the Court through comparative constitutional analysis, examination of domestic and international jurisprudence, and research support in complex constitutional matters. For this purpose, the Research Cell utilizes various national and international legal databases, research platforms, and law sites to facilitate comprehensive constitutional and comparative legal research in support of the Court's adjudicatory functions.

#### **Institutional Development & Future Outlook**

The Research Cell continues to strengthen its role as an essential institutional component of the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan by promoting constitutional learning, scholarly engagement, and research-oriented judicial support. The Court further envisions expanding modern research mechanisms, collaborative academic engagement, and publication initiatives, including a bi-annual newsletter to be published containing scholarly articles, constitutional developments, and analytical case commentaries relating to significant judgments and evolving constitutional jurisprudence.

### Institutional Establishment & Research Support

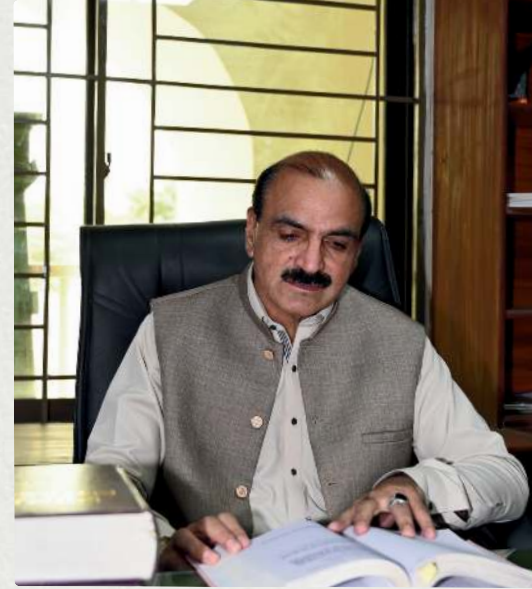

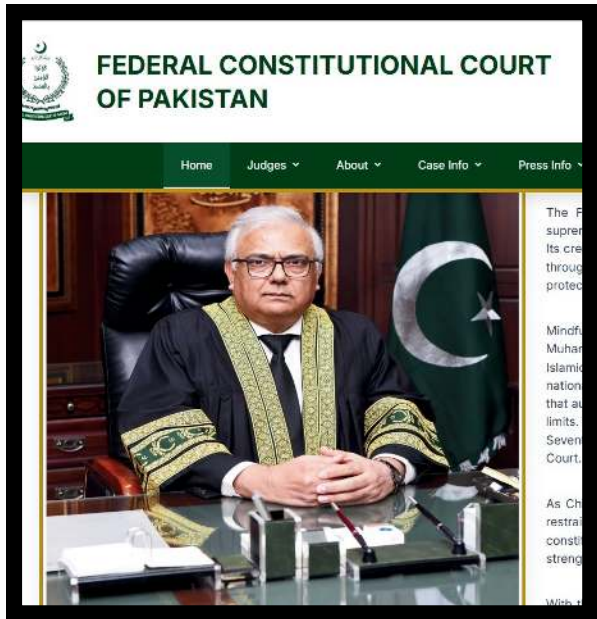

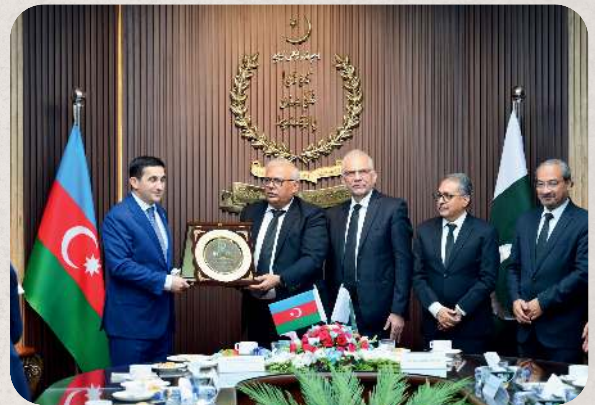

### MS MAIRA HASSAN KHAN



Maira Hassan serves as the Incharge of the Research Cell at the Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan and is also attached to the Chambers of the Chief Justice, where she assists in research on constitutional and judicial matters.

She graduated from the Lahore University of Management Sciences as a recipient of the prestigious NOP Scholarship. Prior to joining the Court, she worked as a Legal Research Associate on a development project funded by the Asian Development Bank in Pakistan. She later served as a Judicial Law Clerk at the Supreme Court of Pakistan until October 2025.

At the Federal Constitutional Court, she has additionally been entrusted with serving as Chairperson of the Committee of Coordinators for the introduction of the Clerkship Program. She is also a member of the Committee on Protection Against Harassment at the Workplace and the Grievance Redressal Committee constituted under Rule 48 of the Public Procurement Rules, 2004, for addressing procurement-related complaints of bidders. ### MS TAYYABA KAKAR

Tayyaba Kakar is a legal professional, judicial researcher, and advocate from Balochistan, Pakistan, currently serving as Research Officer (BS-19) at the Office of the Hon'ble Chief Justice, Federal Constitutional Court of Pakistan. She earned the distinction of becoming the first female Judicial Law Clerk from Balochistan at the Supreme Court of Pakistan and the first female Research Associate to serve in the Research Cell of the Balochistan High Court.

She later became the first Law Officer to head the Quetta Regional Office of the Federal Ombudsperson Secretariat for Protection Against Harassment (FOSPAH), where she established the institution's first-ever regional office in Balochistan in its 15-year history and also served as International Focal Person.
